



THE ROMAN Canon is the oldest Eucharistic Prayer used and dates its arrangement to at least the seventh century. It has undergone minor alterations and modifications, but retains the same essential form it took in the seventh century under Pope Gregory I. Before 1970, it was the only eucharistic prayer in the Roman Missal, but three other eucharistic prayers were newly composed for the Mass of St Paul VI.

The first great turning point in the history of the Roman Canon is the exclusive use of Latin, first in North Africa. Pope Victor I (190-202), an African, seems to have been the first Pope to use it. Latin would become the only language used by Popes in their writings. Greek seems to have disappeared at Rome as a liturgical language in the second half of the third century, though parts of the Liturgy were left in Greek.

Certainly, by the time of Pope Gregory (590AD) the Roman Canon was already fixed in its present order. There are scarcely any changes to note in its history since then. The most important event in the history of the Roman Canon thereafter is not any sort of change in it, but the rapid way in which it spread all over the West.

The Council of Trent (1545–63) ordered that 'the holy Canon composed many centuries ago' should be kept pure and unchanged. It was to be the only one used in the West except for local uses that could be proved to have existed for at least 200 years. This exception allowed the Ambrosian Rite, the Mozarabic Rite, and variants of the Roman Rite developed by religious communities such as Dominicans, Carmelites, and Carthusians, to continue in use.

Pope St John XXIII inserted the name of St Joseph. In the Institution Narrative, Pope St Paul VI later added the phrase *quod pro vobis tradetur* ('which will be given up for you') from Luke's account of the Last Supper to the words of Jesus previously in the Roman Canon, and removed from them the phrase "*mysterium fidei*" ("the mystery of faith"), which was not part of his words. The latter phrase was then used independently as an introduction to an acclamation. Since Pope St Pius V, the Canon does not change except that on a few feasts and occasions slight additions are made, for instance on Maundy Thursday and during the Easter Octave.

23rd August

Reading

1 Thessalonians 1:1-5, 8-10 (RSV)

The Thessalonians' Faith and Example

1 Paul, Silva'nus, and Timothy,

To the church of the Thessalo'nians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ:

Grace to you and peace.

2 We give thanks to God always for you all, constantly mentioning you in our prayers, **3** remembering before our God and Father your work of faith and labour of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. **4** For we know, brethren beloved by God, that he has chosen you; **5** for our gospel came to you not only in word, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction. You know what kind of men we proved to be among you for your sake....**8** For not only has the word of the Lord sounded forth from you in Macedo'nia and Acha'ia, but your faith in God has gone forth everywhere, so that we need not say anything. **9** For they themselves report concerning us what a welcome we had among you, and how you turned to God from idols, to serve a living and true God, **10** and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead, Jesus who delivers us from the wrath to come.

Reflection

THE FIRST Letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians is our main preoccupation in this week's reflections. It is not possible to reconcile the accounts in the Acts of the Apostles and the Letter to the Galatians with each other. Internal evidence strongly suggests that the Galatians

account is the correct one. In Thessalonica we assume, therefore, that it was not three weekends of preaching to the Jewish community in the synagogue but a rather longer period when Paul was addressing primarily Gentiles and not Jews. His listeners 'turned to God from idols, to serve a living and true God', as we heard in the reading (1:9). Furthermore, as the opening to 1 Thessalonians suggests, Timothy was involved in the mission (whereas he was absent in the story as told in Acts). Indeed he is the envoy sent from Athens by Paul and others to the city (3:1-6). The Via Egnatia was the main route from Rome to the East and on it was the cosmopolitan city of Thessalonica. One can imagine St Paul and his companions travelling North from Athens and Corinth up to Thessalonica. The mission to Thessalonica is very early – perhaps as early as 41AD, less than a decade after the Crucifixion, and the First Letter to the Thessalonians might have been compiled anytime between 41 and 52 AD, maybe 48 AD. It is almost certainly the earliest New Testament writing we have and probably a composite letter – with some bits which do not quite fit a unitary composition – and the earliest articulation of Pauline theology, earlier than Galatians and therefore before the development of St Paul's famous doctrine of Justification by Faith through Grace.

St Bartholomew, Apostle

Tuesday 24th August

Reading

John 1:45-51 (RSV)

An Israelite in whom is no Guile

⁴⁵ Philip found Nathan'a-el, and said to him, 'We have found him of whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph.' ⁴⁶ Nathan'a-el said to him, 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' Philip said to him, 'Come and see.' ⁴⁷ Jesus saw Nathan'a-el coming to him, and said of him, 'Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile!' ⁴⁸ Nathan'a-el said to him, 'How do you know me?' Jesus answered him, 'Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you.' ⁴⁹ Nathan'a-el answered him, 'Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!' ⁵⁰ Jesus answered him, 'Because I said to you, I saw you under the fig tree, do you believe? You shall see greater things than these.' ⁵¹ And he said to him, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man.'

Reflection

WE KNOW very little about Bartholomew. He is listed among the Twelve and linked with Philip in the synoptic Gospels but in St John's Gospel his name is missing. Instead, in John, there is a 'Nathaniel' linked with Philip and this Nathaniel does not appear in Matthew, Mark, and Luke. From this we infer that Bartholomew and Nathaniel are one and the same. There are stories about his apostolic career: legends take him further afield but the strongest evidence is that he preached and was martyred in Armenia. He died by being beheaded and skinned. On Monday of Week 14(I) - 5th July - we came across the story of Jacob's Ladder (Genesis 28:12), the story of the shrine at Bethel, the incident to which Jesus draws Nathaniel's attention in today's Gospel.

25th August

Reading

1 Thessalonians 2:[1-8]. 9-13 (RSV)

Paul's Ministry in Thessalonica

[**2** For you yourselves know, brethren, that our visit to you was not in vain; **2** but though we had already suffered and been shamefully treated at Philippi, as you know, we had courage in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in the face of great opposition. **3** For our appeal does not spring from error or uncleanness, nor is it made with guile; **4** but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel, so we speak, not to please men, but to please God who tests our hearts. **5** For we never used either words of flattery, as you know, or a cloak for greed, as God is witness; **6** nor did we seek glory from men, whether from you or from others, though we might have made demands as apostles of Christ. **7** But we were gentle among you, like a nurse taking care of her children. **8** So, being affectionately desirous of you, we were ready to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you had become very dear to us.]

9 For you remember our labour and toil, brethren; we worked night and day, that we might not burden any of you, while we preached to you the gospel of God. **10** You are witnesses, and God also, how holy and righteous and blameless was our behaviour to you believers; **11** for you

know how, like a father with his children, we exhorted each one of you and encouraged you and charged you ¹² to lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory.

¹³ And we also thank God constantly for this, that when you received the word of God which you heard from us, you accepted it not as the word of men but as what it really is, the word of God, which is at work in you believers.

Reflection

WE NEED to conflate yesterday's reading – displaced by the propers for St Bartholomew's Day – with the passage set for today. St Paul is anxious to establish that his missionary endeavours were based on moral exhortation – moral philosophers use the phrase 'parænetic model' – and not on hope of self-glory or personal gain. Things had not worked out well at Philippi, apparently, and Paul is anxious for better results in Thessalonica. It is possible that St Paul is aware of travelling charlatans – the snake oil salesmen of the day – and therefore particularly anxious to present himself as a serious thinker, moral, like a nurse or a gentle father. It is possible too that in that cosmopolitan city St Paul was focusing on the outlook of the Cynics. This school of Greek philosophy distanced itself from ease and pleasure and any new movement – Christianity included – would need to give an account of itself in relation to this cultural outlook.

Thursday in Week 21 [Year 1]

26th August

Reading

1 Thessalonians 3:7-13 (RSV)

3 .. In all our distress and affliction we have been comforted about you through your faith; ⁸ for now we live, if you stand fast in the Lord. ⁹ For what thanksgiving can we render to God for you, for all the joy which we feel for your sake before our God, ¹⁰ praying earnestly night and day that we may see you face to face and supply what is lacking in your faith?

¹¹ Now may our God and Father himself, and our Lord Jesus, direct our way to you; ¹² and may the Lord make you increase and abound in love to one another and to all men, as we do to you, ¹³ so that he may establish

your hearts unblameable in holiness before our God and Father, at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints.

Reflection

THE LAST verse of yesterday's reading was as follows:

we ...thank God constantly for this, that when you received the word of God which you heard from us, you accepted it not as the word of men but as what it really is, the word of God, which is at work in you believers.

Some scholars believe that this from what was the original 'First Letter to the Thessalonians', later included in what we now call '1 Thessalonians'. This early letter, inserted later, includes chapters 2:13 to 4:2 and therefore today's reading. It is entirely possible that the first verse of chapter of '1 Thessalonians' began the original letter. Certainly the theory makes sense of the fact that there is a thanksgiving section not only in chapter 1 but also in chapter 2: formal letters at this time usually began with such a section.

Paul had sent Timothy to see how things were and somewhat emotionally he is full of thanksgiving that Timothy has brought a good report. Clearly the Christian community in Thessalonica is thriving and the missionaries look forward to returning, 'praying ...[to] see [them] face to face and supply what is lacking in [their] faith'.

27th August

Reading

1 Thessalonians 4:1-8 (RSV)

A Life Pleasing to God

4 Finally, brethren, we beseech and exhort you in the Lord Jesus, that as you learned from us how you ought to live and to please God, just as you are doing, you do so more and more. **2** For you know what instructions we gave you through the Lord Jesus. **3** For this is the will of God, your sanctification: that you abstain from immorality; **4** that each one of you know how to control his own body in holiness and honour, **5** not in the

passion of lust like heathen who do not know God; ⁶that no man transgress, and wrong his brother in this matter, because the Lord is an avenger in all these things, as we solemnly forewarned you. ⁷For God has not called us for uncleanness, but in holiness. ⁸Therefore whoever disregards this, disregards not man but God, who gives his Holy Spirit to you.

Reflection

THE THEME of today's First Reading is sanctification – increasing in holiness through receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit. The Thessalonians are asked to abstain from immorality, control the body in holiness and honour, and avoid the passion of lust. These are either separate threats to living the devout life – immorality, lack of self-control, sexual desire - or are a general warning against adultery and the behaviour that is associated with it. Quite what the heathen in Thessalonica were getting up to, we don't know. There may have been specific problems to which Paul is alluding, for example the practice of incest. We are sometimes embarrassed in modern times that sin is so often associated with sexual matters but there is no doubt that in the letters of St Paul there is a strong sense that holiness is closely related to purity.


