Pastoral Letter

EAR FRIENDS

As you will know by now, I am retiring from the parish and ceasing to be Parish Priest at the end of August. Though we have lived in the village for twelve years, I have been in post for eleven years. It has been the happiest time of my life, and the family have enjoyed it too. I am still reasonably energetic, but we think that, at 75, I should move into retirement ministry, probably nearby. We move out of Cozens Farm in August and the transition into retirement has begun with a sabbatical in June and July. It will take the form of a series of short holidays and yet there will be much time to pray and reflect.

The rhythm will change in these summer months: there will be almost no midweek services but Sunday Mass will be at the usual times. I am grateful to Canon Peter Turbitt for celebrating the 9.30am and 11.15am Masses and to Fr David O'Sullivan for celebrating the 6pm Mass. Meanwhile Fr Dominic Adeiza, Parish Priest of Didcot, will look after the school and celebrate Baptism, and I am grateful to him. Fr David O'Sullivan, who is Parish Priest of Wantage, will be an emergency contact (07554 427063).

We do have a small number of weekday communicants, and I am particularly sorry that they will be unable to hear Mass midweek in Hendred. However, there is full provision of weekday Mass in both Didcot and Wantage, and you are advised to consult the websites for both places to ensure that what you are expecting is happening.

In terms of parish administration, Ma Lluïsa Jarne will work her usual hours (details below) and overseeing the transitional arrangements will be Chris Harrison (07885 288422). For the months of June, July, and August, the Bulletin will be published monthly. We have a new priest – Fr Matthew Topham – and he, with his wife and young family, will be moving here in August and taking charge in September.

Needless to say I am deeply grateful to God, and to the parish, for everything that has happened here. It has been a wonderful adventure and I hope it will continue, albeit in a different mode.

Reflection

Flesh and Spirit Sunday 14A (9th July)

You are not in the flesh, you are in the Spirit, if the Spirit of God really dwells in you. *Romans 8:9*

SPIRITUAL experience is not a thing you can order up. Sometimes it is our very reluctance to pray that allows God to take us by surprise and fill out some of our hesitant praying with a sense of peace and joy. Helped by my spiritual reading many years ago, I once found myself dwelling on a sentence from St John of the Cross. 'God's gaze', he says, 'works four blessings in the soul: it cleanses the person, makes her beautiful, enriches and enlightens her' (*Canticle* Second Redaction 32.5).

In the Gospel, Jesus blesses his Father for hiding things from the learned and the clever and revealing them to mere children. He speaks with great compassion about the needs of those who labour and are overburdened. This is not the challenging stuff about taking up your cross and losing your life. It is the message of the Gospel to the simple and the vulnerable. The yoke is still there to be shouldered but it is an easy yoke and a light burden.

Church life has two very different sides. The one is public and full of pomp. Functionaries wear special clothes. Special liturgies are performed, people are welcomed, and corporate refreshment is taken. But the other side is very different, and, of course, much more important. It is neither public nor pompous: rather it is personal and simple. No special clothes need to be worn, indeed one needs to lay one's soul bare. Though there is a work of prayer and contemplation, there is no liturgy or required form. There is no one to be welcomed except the Light of the World who knocks at the door. Nor is the refreshment corporate. All Christians – clergy and religious included – are urged not to neglect this other, inner side. Indeed, our church communities exist to nourish and cherish it as we meet for Mass at the foot of the Cross and enter into the movement of Christ's self-offering to the Father.

The clue to it, I think, is devotion to the person of Jesus. A favourite piece of mine is the Bach motet *Jesu meine Freude*. Often sung in translation as 'Jesu, Priceless Treasure'. The motet has eleven movements. The odd numbers – 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11 – are verses of Johann Frank's chorale, set to Johann Cruger's chorale tune, harmonised inventively by Johann Sebastian Bach. Formally it is very satisfying, a parabola: movements 1 and 11 are similar, as are 3 and 9 and 5 and 7. The even numbers – 2, 4, 6, 8, 10 – are also pairs: 2 and 10, 4 and 8. All the even- numbered movements are freely-composed pieces, using texts from the eighth chapter of the Epistle

to the Romans. The centre-piece of the motet is movement 6: 'You are not of the flesh but of the Spirit'. What the chorale movements do is concentrate our attention on the person of Jesus. He is my priceless treasure, the one I long for, my refuge, he guards me against the fear of death, the very antithesis of earthly treasure, the great alternative to carnality. The other movements place before us the characteristics of the life of those who live in the Spirit. There is no condemnation for those in Christ for the law of the Spirit gives life and sets us free. The body is dead, but the Spirit lives, and so on.

I suspect that the strength of this motet is that it combines the early stirrings of the German Pietist movement – with their fierce insistence on inner life and holiness – with the glory of the high Lutheran tradition, as expressed in the external and internal wonder of music. It has the external expression that we find in public liturgy and the internal intensity of devotion to Jesus. I am sure I have said enough to indicate why, for me, this motet perfectly captures what today's readings are about.

And if we see, in the Old Testament Reading, Zechariah's 'daughter of Zion' not only as Israel – the Church - waiting for her Lord, but as the meek soul – Mary - waiting obediently on Gabriel, we are reminded that our soul must be 'quieted and stilled', as Psalm 131 puts it.

But I have quieted and stilled my soul, like a weaned child on its mother; so my soul is quieted within me.

If the soul is thus quieted then, indeed, it may experience the blessings which I referred to earlier, as described by John of the Cross.

'God's gaze works four blessings in the soul: it cleanses the person, makes her beautiful, enriches and enlightens her'

(Canticle Second Redaction 32.5).

....cleanses, makes beautiful, enriches, enlightens.

Whatever your customary place, waiting upon God - wherever you are physically - remember:

You are not in the flesh, you are in the Spirit, if the Spirit of God really dwells in you.






