THE LITANY OF S. JOSEPH

March is the Month of S. Joseph, and to mark this fact, the Litany of S. Joseph will be recited after Mass during the week, These reflections are offered as an aid to devotion.

Joseph Fortissime | Joseph Most Mighty

Of what might the might of S. Joseph be supposed to consist? First, the gentle strength of his fortitude on earth, as we see in his protection of the Holy Family, the Flight into Egypt, and so forth. Such fortitude – unflashy and usually unremarked – is the calling of all Fathers as they guard and guide the families entrusted to them. But Joeph's Might now – a consequence of that earthly fortitude – is the strength of his prayers, to which the Christian faithful have recourse, convinced of their efficacy.

Joseph Obedientissime | Joseph Most Obedient

The characteristic of S. Joseph in the Gospels is obedience. Admonished not to fear t take Mary into his home (*Matt. 1:20*), Joseph does so. Warned to flee into Egypt, he does so (*Matt. 2:13*). Told to return (*Matt. 2:20*), again, he does so. S. Matthew interposes no hesitation, no questioning, between the divine command and the obedient response. This ready acquiescence with the Lord's commands is something we ought to strive to emulate, since to be ready to do God's will is to participate in God, to be joined with Him in a real union of the will, not only like S. Joseph, most obedient, but also like Our Lord, "Who became obedient unto death, even death on a Cross" (*Phil. 2:8*)

Joseph Fidelissime | Joseph Most Faithful

In what did S. Joseph have Faith? In the fidelity of God to His promises, certainly. We are not told in the Scriptures of his faith in his Divine foster-Son, but the content of the first angelic revelation to him in sleep contains the germ of it: "you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people form their sins" (Matt. 1:21). Indeed, salvation through Christ is the crux (if we can pardon that terrible pun) of the Christian faith. Beleiving this, we imitate S. Joseph, and join with our Father-in-Faith Abraham, who "believed the Lord; and he reckoned it to him as righteousness." (*Gen* 15:6).

Speculum Patientiæ | Mirror of Patience

S. Joseph's faithful trust in the Lord required patience: it is one thing to assent to God's will for one's life once; to do so day by day, year by year, as

those designs unfold – usually unseen to us – is another matter, and requires the virtue of patience. Thus we can look at S. Joseph, as he waits for the command to return from Egypt, or waits for the growth of this foster-son Who is destined to redeem mankind, and see there that patience which we too must have, if we are to persevere in this life of Christian service which God desires of us. But more than that: S. Josph is also a mirror of the Divine Patience, which flows perhaps from the Eternity of God, Who is never early and never late, but rather always 'just in time'. With these two reflections, perhaps trust in God's merciful action in our lives becomes just a little easier.

Amator Paupertatis | Lover of Poverty

There is a kind of reflexive image of the Holy Family as a *poor* family which is not in fact found in Scripture. Perhaps we ought to blame the Franciscans in the 13th century, but the image is certainly an enduring one, and may quite possibly have been true. But the poverty which S. Jospeh loved was not simply material want, but the spiritual poverty of which Our Lord spoke in the Beatitudes: "Blessed are the poor *in spirit*" (*Matt. 5:3*), a spirit of smallness, humility, and self-giving love, mirroring the freely-chosen 'poverty' of Jesus Christ, Who "though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, 7 but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men" (*Phil. 2:6-7*).

'LAUDATE' SUNDAY

Today is the Fourth Sunday in Lent, but it is also called 'Laudate' Sunday. What does that mean? 'Laudate' is the Latin for 'Rejoice!' – a command, not a suggestion!

Why is it called that? 'Laudate' is the first word – the *incipit* – of the Introit (entrance chant) of the Mass, taken from *Isaiah 66:10*: 'Rejoice, Jerusalem...'' It's common to name Sundays like that – 'Quasimodo' Sunday (2^{nd} after Easter) or 'Gaudete' Sunday (3^{rd} of Advent).

What's different? Today in many places, purple will be replaced by rosecoloured vestments and hangings, to symbolise the lightened penitence of this 'rest' Sunday in Lent. If you'd like to see dignified rose vestments at S. Mary's, why not chip in to the vestment fund...?
